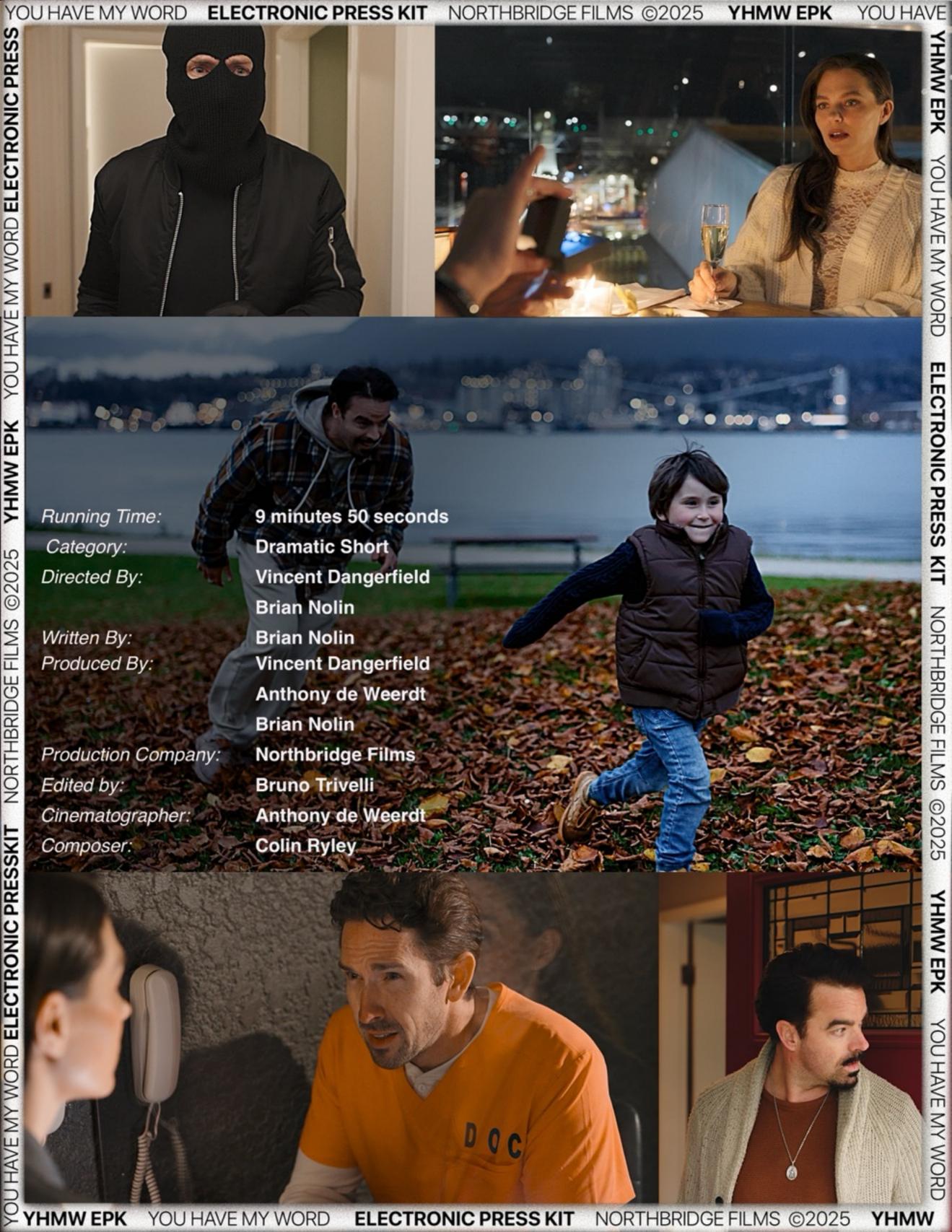

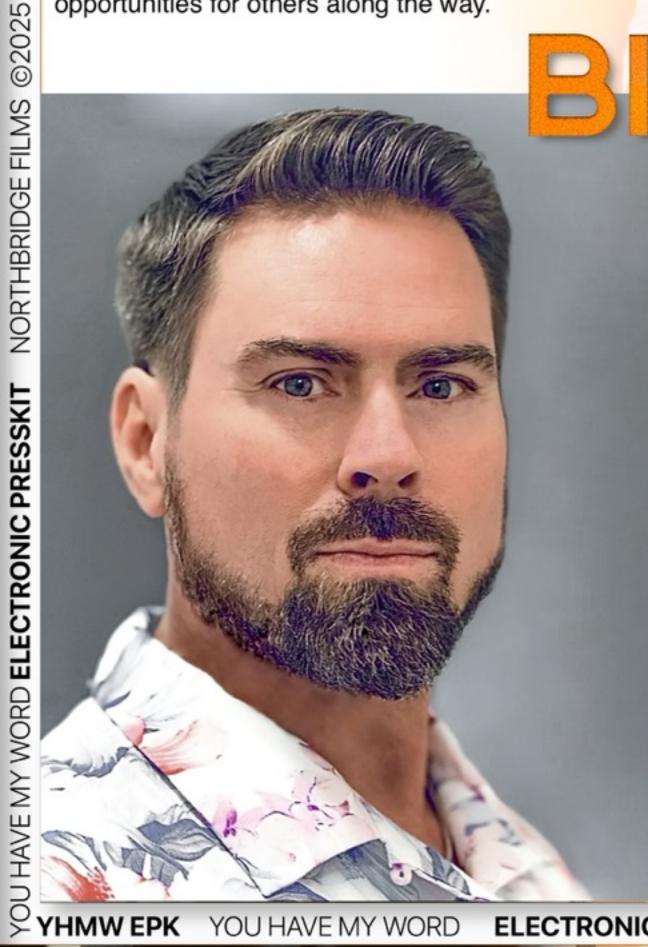

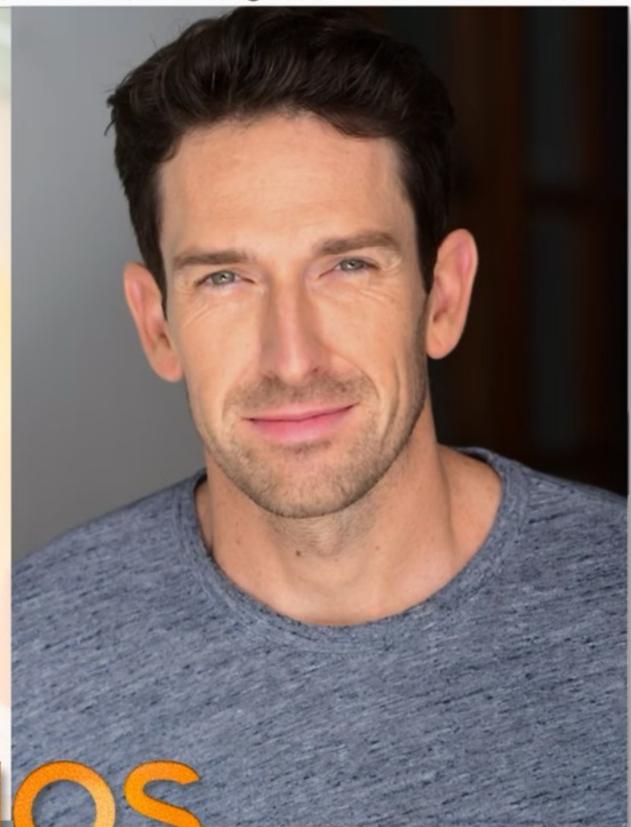
With over a decade of training and credits in film and television, Vincent Dangerfield brings the professionalism every actor needs to fully commit to his craft.

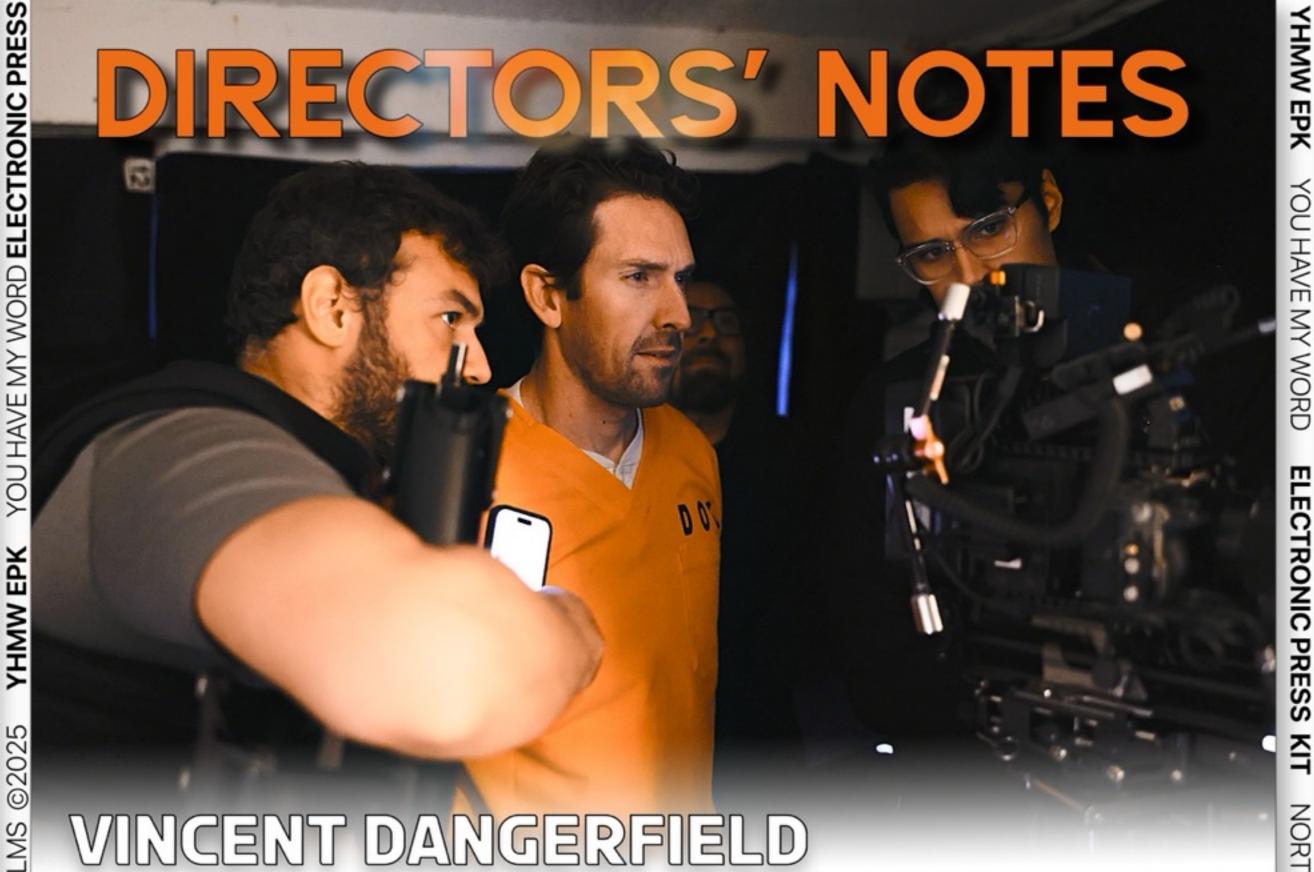

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ON LOCATIONS:

Finding the four locations for this ten minute film, specifically the gym and restaurant, is something I'm particularly proud of. It was a lofty goal on our tight budget, but to attain both locations free of charge was, I think, something most people wouldnt believe to be possible.

The gym space was relatively straightforward through a friend of mine, I had previously met and worked with the owner of the space about six months prior.

Worked wing the restain required was work at the work The restaurant, however, not so simple. It's a very busy establishment on Granville Island that required weeks of back-and-forth between myself, the GM and head office. To make a long short, they were happy to support the local arts and our project, especially given that Brian and I both used to work at their fine establishment. (Fun fact, this is where we first met.)

Then suddenly, the night before the shoot, it looked as though we were going to have to pull the plug. We were told by head office our insurance was insufficient and they required a substantial amount of more coverage.

In the end Brian and I decided to break open the piggy bank and cover the cost because at that point we had our hearts set on it and could not imagine filming anywhere else. It's tough making those calls when you're doing everything out of pocket, but in the end it all worked out and was worth every

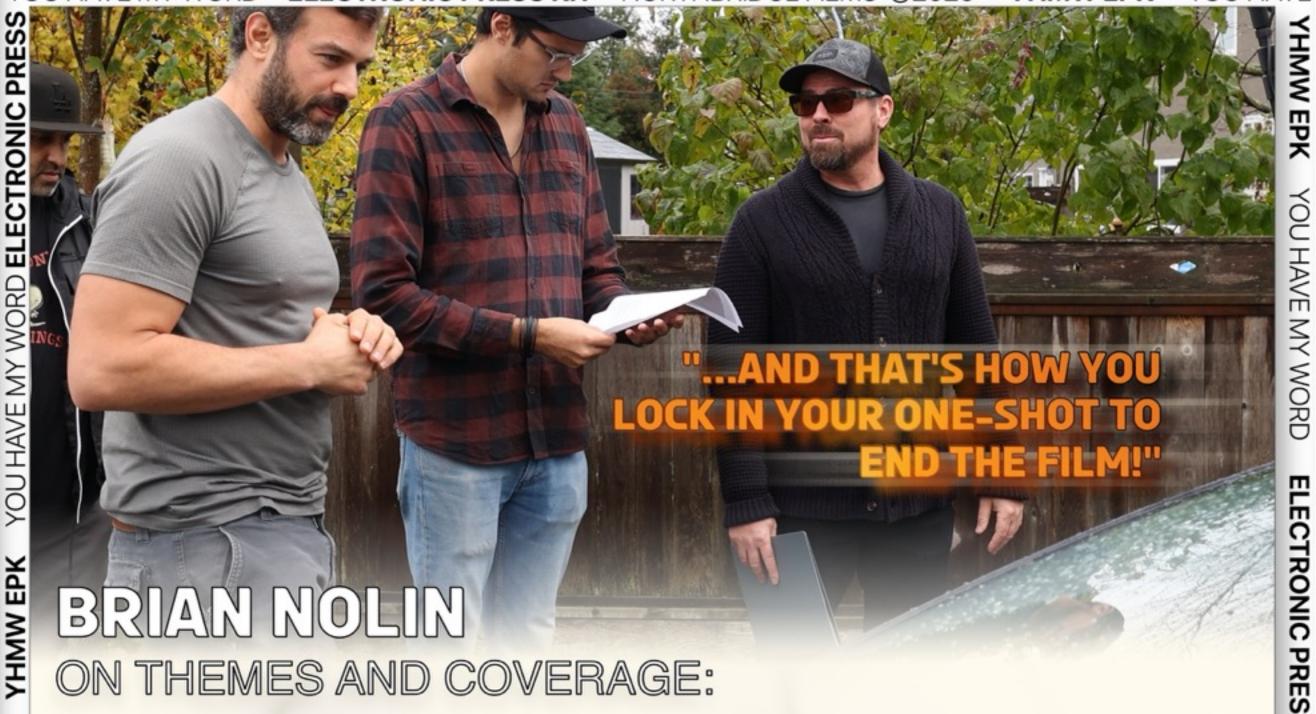
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There's always something entertaining about watching the mishaps and misfortunes of others when it's brought on by none other than themselves. I remember watching Dirty Rotten Scoundrels and thinking how strange it is to cheer for any of these dispicable characters. In retrospect, I think I was more so cheering on the karmic theme while hoping at least one of these clued out characters would catch on. In You have My Word we tell a similar tale of three deeply flawed people, hustling each other as they attempt to get ahead.

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I had a good feeling about this film from the start. All three of us have worked in the industry for years but I didn't officially meet Anthony until we were on set. And yet I already know this is going to be the first of many projects together because from the moment we entered pre-production it felt like we'd been working together for years. The entire Crew excelled in their positions and Vincent, Brittany and Christopher played their roles in perfect harmony to bring these pages to life.

The theme of the film is conveniently woven into the action of the script allowing us to watch the characters rewrite their moral playbook while on the move. An example of this is the opening burglary scene where the theme is found on a note inside the safe. And then a moment later the chase is on. So,...how do you shoot it?

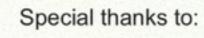

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Q&A WITH DIRECTORS VINCENT DANGERFIELD & BRIAN NOLIN

Is it harder to get started or to keep going? What was the particular thing that you had to conquer to do either?

VINCENT: It was most certainly harder to get started because once it was in motion, it was almost a wave that I just had to ride, it felt effortless to keep it going. The thing I had to overcome to get started, was my own limiting beliefs around whether I could pull it off or not. Whether I'd be able to even fund a short film or not.

When do you know a script is ready to shoot, and what is your process of getting it there?

BRIAN: When the storyline and characters are clear and you can see yourself shooting the scenes, I think it's good to go. I don't get hung up on dialogue and smaller things, they tend to get changed so many times on set for something different and it always turns out for the better.

Was there a particular event or time that you recognized that filmmaking was not just a hobby, but that it would be your life and your living?

VINCENT: I have been an actor in film and television for roughly 12 years now, and I have always felt, since starting, that it's what I am meant to do. There are few things I know of that light me up as much as this medium storytelling, and once I decided to spread my wings into filmmaking, I discovered a new depth of passion for this art that I didn't know existed in me. This is how I know it's what I must continue to do.

What advice would you give someone who wanted a career in film?

BRIAN: Talk less, listen more. Be flexible and plan ahead. In film you have to clear your own path and be prepared when it intersects with others. You always want a long term game plan that incudes an exciting answer to the inevitable question "what are you working on next?"

You are a collaborator. How have you discovered members of your team and how do you keep the relationship with them strong?

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YINCENT: Fride with you have met An working on bartenders a work very we from individuation something VINCENT: Filmmaking is definitely a collaborative effort involving like-minded people who wanna go on that ride with you. It took many years in the industry for me to connect the dots, but I was fortunate enough to have met Anthony on set of a Steven Spielberg movie doing background. In the years since, he had been working on film crews and building his own camera kit. I met Brian working in the service industry as bartenders and all these years later followed my intuition to reach out to them both.

I think when you find the right people who share your passion and your vision for the art of filmmaking, it's relatively easy to keep those relationships going. I feel that the three of us are very lucky because we all work very well together. We each fill a different need or expertise within the team that brings out our best from individual perspectives. That, with a deep rooted respect for one another, allows for us to create something special.

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
